





Number of PSAs Audited Accuracy Rate






The Public Safety Assessment (PSA) is a standardized assessment that predicts failure to appear (FTA) in court for a pending charge, a new criminal arrest (NCA) while on pretrial release, and a new violent criminal arrest (NCA Violent) while on pretrial release.




Buncombe County Release Conditions Matrix





Concurrency Rate

The concurrency rate indicates the percent of supervisions opened in which the recommendation from the PSA aligns with the release decision made by the judicial official. It is the number of supervisions with a judicial override divided by all opened supervisions.







Fiscal Year 2021 Referrals and Closures

A person can be referred to pretrial supervision by a district or superior court judge. They can be assigned to supervision on more than one charge or might not be referred to supervision for all pending charges. For the purposes of this report, a supervision is counted as one supervision regardless of the number of charges they have been referred to supervision for. For example, if a person has six pending charges in Buncombe County, and they have been referred to Pretrial on four of those charges, that is counted as one supervision.















Tech. Violation Rate

When a supervision is closed, it is flagged as successful or unsuccessful. Unsuccessful supervisions are closed due to the following reasons: a new charge occurs, an individual fails to appear in court, an individual violates release conditions (technical violation), or some combination thereof. A closed supervision that is unsuccessful is counted as a technical violation if "technical violation" is the only disposition reason identified on the supervision.









Supported by the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation

A \$246 million national initiative to reduce over-incarceration and advance racial equity in local criminal justice systems by changing the way America thinks about and uses jails.

The grant brings the Foundation's total investment in Buncombe County to \$3.55 million to date.

There are 21 implementation sites nationwide, implementing reforms to make their local justice system more equitable and more effective.

Buncombe County surpassed the original SJC goal to reduce the jail population by 15%, with the average monthly population declining by 30% between February 2019 and January 2021.



Jail Population Updates

- Original goal, as part of this grant, was for Buncombe County to reduce the jail population by 15 percent (not including contracted beds).
 - Baseline Population: 385 (November 1, 2017-April 30, 2018)
 - Goal Population: 327 (15 percent or 58 beds)
 - Historical Population: 383 (Quarter 1 2018)
- In recent months, the jail population has started increase again, with July's average monthly population hitting 360.




Jail Population Updates

- During the pandemic, we saw:
 - Significant reduction is the number of people held in jail due only to a failure to appear in court (FTA)
 - Increased number of people with lower-level offenses released without having to pay bail/bond
 - Importantly, we did <u>not</u> see a corresponding increase in recidivism rates for FTA or new charges.
