- 3. Develop the Plan to create vision, strategies, and goals





Planning Phases



Comparison Counties

County	Population
Buncombe	261,191
Orange	149,077
Durham	321,488
Wake	1,111,761
Mecklenburg	1,128,945



Staffing & Funding

County	Annual County Budget & Staffing
Buncombe	Staffing: Department of Health and Human Services (No dedicated position) Funding: \$572K (City Staff for HIAC, Code Purple, Homeward Bound outreach and case management); AHSP funds may also be used to address homelessness
Orange	Staffing: Community Development Division (15 FTE (Director (1), Housing Access Coordinator (landlord recruitment and incentive payments) (1), Coordinated Entry (6), Street Outreach (4 (Clinician (1); Peer Support Navigator (3)), ESG Homeless Prevention (1), Rapid Re-housing Coordinator (2)) Funding: \$900K (\$800K (CoC funds administered by County); \$100K (Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funds);
Durham	Staffing: Department of Social Services (2+FTE (Supervisor (1) with additional roles; Social Workers (2) that complete applications for coordinated entry under contract from CoC but funded by County) Funding: \$150K (street outreach)
Wake	Staffing: Housing Division (46 FTE (20-30 working directly at men's shelter; street outreach team; coordinated entry)) Funding: \$5.7M (Funds and staffs men's shelter; provides funds to all other shelters in County)
Mecklenburg	Staffing: Homelessness Services Department (31 FTE) Funding: \$9.2M (\$3M HUD, \$6.2M Mecklenburg County funds)



Continuum of Care (CoC)

County	CoC Structure
Buncombe	Lead: City of Asheville County Role: County appoints members to joint Homeless Initiative Advisory Committee (HIAC); assists in funding City staff to HIAC; oversees County funded contracts/grants
Orange	Lead: Orange County Partnership to End Homelessness County Role: Orange County Partnership to End Homelessness is housed within County's Community Development Division; MOU with 4 municipalities who all provide funding; County pays 40% and other municipalities pay remainder
Durham	Lead: City of Durham County Role: County to provides and funds coordinated entry under CoC contract
Wake	Lead: Raleigh-Wake Partnership to End Homelessness County Role: Participant in the CoC with 30+ public, private, and nonprofit members (includes City of Raleigh, Town of Cary, Alliance Health, & The Salvation Army of Wake County)
Mecklenburg	Lead: Mecklenburg County (took over responsibility from City of Charlotte 2 years ago) County Role: Coordinated entry through 2-1-1 service



Outreach & Low Barrier Shelters

County	Outreach & Low Barrier Shelters
Buncombe	Outreach: County funds Pack Library outreach and other efforts by Homeward Bound Low Barrier Shelters: Several shelters are available (men, women, families, medical respite, those fleeing domestic violence) but are not funded by County specifically
Orange	Outreach: County has 4-person in-house outreach team (Clinician (1) & Peer Support Navigators(3)) Low Barrier Shelters: One shelter (Inter-Faith Council) available in the county; shelter receives funding from HUD independently
Durham	Outreach: Unique consolidated services structure with city Low Barrier Shelters: No low barrier shelter; have 3 shelters in the County
Wake	Outreach: County has in-house outreach team Low Barrier Shelters: County funds most shelters (LBS and transitional); County supports hotel conversions for low-barrier shelter and use as tool for permanent re-housing
Mecklenburg	Outreach: Partner organizations provide outreach Low Barrier Shelters: Closest option run by partner organization (Roof Above); 300 and 500 bed capacity shelters



White Flag / Code Purple

County	White Flag / Code Purple
Buncombe	Open nights when temperature is expected to be less than 33 degrees; County and City of Asheville jointly fund two participating shelters (ABCCM & Salvation Army); many other providers
Orange	Open continuously November through April without regard to temperature; operated by Inter-Faith Council Community House
Durham	Open continuously January through March without regard to temperature; first come first served (20 beds), but medically vulnerable are given priority; also provide hotels for families during White flag nights (15-20 rooms); run by CoC (contract for service funded through the City of Durham)
Wake	Open nights when temperatures are expected to be below 35 degrees; response is led by separate, partner entities (St. John's Metropolitan Community Church & Salvation Army)
Mecklenburg	Open nights as determined by Emergency Management Department and Shelter Task Force; County partners with other municipalities to operate several expanded shelters (Roof Above and Salvation Army Center of Hope) as well as at high schools and recreation centers



Key Takeaways from Comparison Counties

- County organizational structure, funding, and staffing varies
- All comparison counties provide and fund some homeless response within County
- Coordinated entry is provided by each comparison counties
- Continuum of Care (CoC) Leads vary: Organization, County, or City
- CoC Lead coordinates homelessness programming and implementation and manages funds
