Executive Summary

The Buncombe County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC), in fulfillment of the duties and responsibilities as set forth in the General Statutes of the State of North Carolina, has completed the activities required to develop this County Plan for FY 2011 through FY 2012.

The JCPC has identified the issues and factors which have an influence and impact upon delinquent youth, at-risk youth, and their families in Buncombe County. Further, the JCPC has identified the strategies and services most likely to reduce/prevent delinquent behavior.

<u>JCPC Action Plan:</u> An Action Plan to impact delinquent behavior (included in this document) has been developed. With the goals, measurable objectives and corresponding outcomes, the JCPC proposes to:

- 1. To prevent or reduce delinquent behavior
- 2. Improve Communication between Juvenile Court Counselors, JCPC and JCPC Funded Programs
- 3. Improve function of JCPC operations
- 4. To increase community awareness and understanding of juvenile justice issues

<u>Priorities for Funding:</u> Through a risk & needs assessment and a resource assessment, the JCPC has determined that the following services are needed to reduce/prevent delinquency in Buncombe County.

- 1. Parent/Family Skills for families of hard-to-serve court involved youth
- 2. Interpersonal Skills (to include community based services)
- 3. Experiential Skills
- 4. Tutoring/Academic Enhancement
- 5. Vocational Skills
- 6. Mediation
- 7. Restitution
- 8. Teen Court
- 9. Structured Day
- 10. Sexual Offender Treatment
- 11. Runaway Shelter
- 12. Specialized Foster Care for Juvenile Sex Offenders
- 13. Temporary Foster Care
- 14. Mentoring for Court involved youth

Monitoring and Evaluation: Each program funded in the past year by the JCPC has been monitored. The monitoring results and program outcomes evaluations were considered in making funding allocation decisions. The JCPC continues to conduct implementation monitoring of its action plan and its funded programs on a quarterly basis.

<u>Funding Recommendations:</u> Having published a Request for Proposals for these needed services for a minimum of thirty (30) days, the JCPC has screened the submitted proposals and has determined which proposals best meet the advertised needed services. As required by statute, the JCPC recommends allocation of the NC Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (NC DJJDP) Funds to the following Programs in the amounts specified below for FY 11-12 (<u>See JCPC Funding Allocations page</u>):

Part I Risk

The Risk and Needs Assessment Committee reviewed data gleaned from the Juvenile Risk Assessment instrument administered by Juvenile Court Counselors after juveniles are referred with a complaint alleging that a delinquent act has occurred and prior to adjudication of the juvenile. The Juvenile Risk Assessment is an instrument used to predict the likelihood of the juvenile being involved in future delinquent behavior. For some youth, some of the individual item ratings may be heavily dependent upon information reported by the juvenile or the parent(s). For these items (represented by percentages which with a star next to them), there is a likelihood of under-reporting the incidence of a particular behavior and the actual incidence may be higher than suggested by these figures. In those cases, the figure should be interpreted as a measure of the minimum level of occurrence.

Demographic and Other Observations

There continues to be a high number of youth with moderate to serious School Behavior Problems. The courts and school system need to work together.

The recidivism rate for Buncombe County is 28.65% compared to the state's percentage at 25.45% and Gaston County at 24.43%.

There are generational trends with delinquent youth. Sibling and relatives are influences as well as enablers. Parental supervision is 67% marginal, 2009-10 and 30 % of families have a criminal history.


Youth associating with delinquent peers continues to have an increasing trend of gang association.

Due to the volume of youth going through the court system, pre-court services are now available.

Buncombe County Risk Factor Observations: FY 2009-2010

R4 Prior Assaults – 24% of disposed youth have been involved in some type of assaultive behavior. 5% were involved in an affray, 15% were involved in an assault without a weapon, and 3% were involved in an assault with a weapon.

R8 Relationships with Peers – The number of disposed youth who regularly associate with delinquent peers rose from 31% in 2008-09 to 44% in 2009-10. This is a large increase and high percentage of youth who are ripe for gang involvement. In 2007-09 the percentage of youth associating with or involved with gangs increased from 1% to 7% and in 2008-09 rose to 8%. In 2009-10 the percentage dropped to 7%, still staying consistent.

Part II. Needs

The Risk and Needs Assessment Committee also reviewed data gleaned from the Juvenile Needs Assessment instrument administered by Juvenile Court Counselors prior to court disposition of a juvenile. The Juvenile Needs Assessment is an instrument used to examine a youth's needs in the various domains of his life: The Individual Domain, The School Domain, The Peer Domain, and the Community Domain. This instrument was designed to detect service intervention needs as an aid in service planning. As with the Juvenile Risk Assessment, some of the individual item ratings may be heavily dependent upon information reported by the juvenile or the parent(s). For these items (represented by percentages which with a star next to them), there is a likelihood of under-reporting the incidence of a particular behavior and the actual incidence may be higher than suggested by these figures. In those cases, the figure should be interpreted as a measure of the minimum level of occurrence.

Buncombe County Elevated Needs Observations: FY 2009-2010

Y2 School Behavior – 22% of disposed youth have moderate school behavior problems and 51% have serious school behavior problems.

Y4 Substance Abuse – 24% of disposed youth have had some substance use and need further assessment. 23% of disposed youth have abused substances and need further assessment and/or treatment.

Y8 Mental Health Needs – 31% of disposed youth exhibit behaviors indicating a need for additional mental health assessment. 57% of disposed youth have mental health needs that are currently being addressed.

F1 Conflict in the Home – 24% of disposed youth are living in families with conflict in the home. 10% of disposed youth live in homes where domestic violence occurs.

F2 Family Supervision – 67% of disposed youth have parents/guardians with marginal parenting skills.



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Buncombe JCPC Funded Program Descriptions

2011-2012

Youth Mediation Program: The Youth Mediation Program serves youth with conflict resolution services including mediation, victim offender mediation, and truancy mediation and guided problem solving. The Youth Mediation Program empowers juveniles to manage and resolve conflicts. In mediation, youth communicate their feelings and needs regarding a problem. They are also asked to empathize with the other person by listening to their perspective on the situation. Outcomes are mutually defined by all participants through cooperation and negotiation, enhancing interpersonal and problem solving skills.

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<u>Home Based Services for Juvenile Sex Offenders</u>: Our program offers services to clients who have been adjudicated for a sexual offense and have been ordered by the court to participate in an evaluation and/or treatment. The objective of the program is to provide a broad range of services to allow these youth to remain in their homes, promote safety in the community, and to prevent further sexual abuse. Services include safety and treatment planning, case management, 24/7 on call, individual group and family therapy.

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<u>Trinity Place Runaway and Homeless Youth Shelter</u>: Trinity Place provides a short term (15 days for less), co-ed emergency shelter for up to six youths ages 7 to 17 whom are homeless, have run away from home or are at risk of running. Trinity Place provides a safe, non-secure residential care for runaway and homeless youth as well as youth in need of respite. The program provides assistance aimed at reuniting the family or arranging appropriate long-term

placement. Trinity Place staff helps parents develop plans and family connectedness. While a youth is in care at Trinity Place, program staff attempt to help youth and families arrange for the long-term services that will help them work through on-going problems.

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Earn and Learn: The Earn and Learn Restitution Program is a post-adjudication restitution program for juvenile offenders. Its premise is that restitution is effective only if a juvenile accepts responsibility for his or her offenses and is committed to the principle of making amends to the victim. The program is initiated after a presentence investigation when a probation officer recommends the youth either for incarceration or for probation. Those recommended for probation may also be placed into the restitution program.

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Teen Court: Teen Court is an early intervention program that is both community service and community resource based. Teen Court serves first time youthful offenders who admit guilt to their actions and are given an opportunity to be heard in a court of their peers with an adult judge. Its purpose it to require young people to take responsibility for their actions and to allow the community to take an active role in addressing juvenile crime. It is designed to provide a community-based alternative to the formal court process, as well as divert caseloads for the juvenile court counselors. The program addresses an accountability approach that encourages a sense of responsibility on the part of the juvenile and their families. Teen court permits redirection of the available juvenile court time and resources to focus on more at risk offenders. In addition, it is hoped that these approaches will reduce the likelihood of juveniles re-offending and minimize negative labeling of referred youth. The program utilizes over 80 volunteers in Buncombe County from Baliff, clerk of courts, adult judges and youth attorney's and jurors who

are trained twice a year and volunteer to prepare youth cases. We have a high percentage of our defendants who maintain a C average come back and participate after their mandatory sentence is complete.

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Aspire Structured Day: The Aspire Structured Day program operates Monday through Friday from 8am to 3pm and serves court-involved/at-risk youth ages 10-17. It provides academics, mental health, and substance abuse interventions in an integrated manner during the program day. It consists of academic classes, skill building groups, and counseling services, as well as transportation to/from the program daily. There are also opportunities for enrichment field trips and community service activities. Parent support and training is also offered to families, including afterhours if necessary.

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Temporary Therapeutic Foster Care: TTFC is a temporary out of home placement for children ages 6-17 involved with the Buncombe County DJJDP. Children are placed in a licensed therapeutic foster home for a period of no more than 30 days. Child will remain in the same school they were enrolled in at time of placement. Temporary Therapeutic Foster Parents will provide skill building; supportive guidance; and supervision. TTFC staff will provide 24 hour support for child and TTFPs. TTFC staff will meet with team weekly to monitor progress

toward discharge. TTFC will allow time for assessments to be completed, as needed. If the goal for a child is continued out of home placement TTFC allows time to identify the best placement for a child instead of a first available placement. TTFC provides an alternative to detention placement for children appropriate for placement in a family and community setting.

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
