In 2009, the Buncombe County Detention Center facilitated a study of substance abuse by Western Carolina University. The results clearly show that crime in Buncombe County is closely related to substance abuse:

- 52% of male detainees have likely substance dependence
- 64% of female detainees have likely substance dependence
- •Almost 70% of detainees committed their crime while under the influence of a substance, or committed the crime to obtain substances

Services at the Detention Facility:

- An average of 65 incarcerated people a month already have a substance abuse/mental health provider. The provider is notified.
 - An average of 130 people a month are put on the detox protocol at the Detention Facility. The protocol aims to prevent medical complications from both physical and psychological withdrawal.
 - Over 100 people a month engage Alcoholics Anonymous and Narcotics Anonymous at the Detention Facility.
 - An average of 400 people a month are served in psycho-education groups at the Detention Facility.
 - An average of 80 people a month are served by the certified substance abuse specialist or the mental health case manager at the Detention Facility. Each person receives a re-entry care plan and a County human service guide.
 - Since January 2010, more than 110 people with severe and persistent mental illness have been diverted from the Detention Facility into treatment.

In 2009, a recidivism study was conducted by RHA Health Services:

Substance abuse case management prevents 1.5 arrests

- •Mental health case management prevents .75 arrests
- Jail diversion (JUST Program) prevented larrest

Applying Average Length of Stay Rates:

- Jail diversion services prevented 1,154 arrests
- •31,158 days in jail were prevented, leaving 85 jail beds available which were not needed because of diversion
- Preventing recidivism means less crime, which means a safer community
- Preventing arrests also frees-up law enforcement time to focus on other citizen safety issues
