

Influenza and Pertussis Update for Medical Providers March 4, 2014

- 1. Pertussis: We continue to see an increase in pertussis in Buncombe County.
 - In February there were 3 lab-confirmed cases of pertussis in the County.
 - Only 4 days into March we've already had 7 reported cases of pertussis, 2 of which have been lab-confirmed so far.
 - Most of the pertussis has been in children, many of whom have been unvaccinated.
 - Please contact the Disease Control staff of the Buncombe County Dept. of Health (250-5109; available at all hours, all days) <u>immediately</u> if you see someone you <u>SUSPECT</u> of having pertussis.
 - o By doing so, you help us prevent the spread of pertussis in our community.
 - Please remember to tell those patients you suspect or know to have pertussis to stay home under respiratory isolation (no work, no school, no extracurricular activities, no grocery shopping, etc.) until they finish their course of antibiotics. Until completing their antibiotics, they should definitely stay away from unvaccinated infants and all pregnant women in their 3rd trimester.
 - Please also continue to encourage vaccination of your patients with Tdap, including pregnant women in their 3rd trimester.
 - If you are unable to provide your patients Tdap in your office, please send them to the Buncombe County Department of Health's Immunization Clinic (40 Coxe Ave., Monday-Friday, 8am-5pm, no appointment necessary).
- 2. <u>Influenza</u> continues to circulate in NC and locally, although the overall incidence of influenza-like illness has decreased since the beginning of February.
 - As of February 22, 2014, the total # of flu-associated deaths reported so far this season in NC is 81.
 - As you can see from the graph below (from NC DPH), most of these deaths continue to be in people 25-64 years of age.

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- We continue to hold at 2 flu-associated deaths in Buncombe County residents this flu season.
 - Please remember that you must report ALL influenza-associated deaths to your local health department.



- Most of the circulating flu virus typed out in NC (and nationwide) continues to be influenza A (pH1N1), which is one of the strains in the current vaccine.
- Vaccination is encouraged for all people 6 months of age or older until the end of fluseason, which can go as late as May.
 - The Buncombe County Dept. of Health continues to have influenza vaccine available, including some no-cost vaccine for uninsured Buncombe County residents who meet certain financial criteria.
- Guidance documents and weekly flu surveillance updates are available at <u>flu.nc.gov</u>.
 Surveillance updates are posted every Thursday under the "Facts and Figures" tab.
