















HHS Communications

To promote the most recent NC immunization requirements for schoolaged children, the Communications Team developed new tools for the Shield of Protection campaign to target childcare providers, parents of school-aged children, and kids themselves. Communications and Health jointly hosted another successful screening of The Invisible Threat for childcare providers and used it as an opportunity to educate, distribute materials and answer questions. The event also provided continuing education credits for those in attendance through a partnership with Smart Start Buncombe County. To further one of our key strategies to improve immunization rates: the Communications Team partnered with local high school students to create a video for schools to use to promote immunizations. It was entirely written and produced by a group of Nesbitt Academy students and with the help of County PR's video production capabilities, the video is now available and will be used to educate students about the importance of immunizations. Materials to promote immunizations now include posters, social media ads, customized tools for childcares and school nurses, and short videos.
