- Affordable Housing
- Appropriate Services
- Adequate Income



PSH Successes & Evidence

- Decreases in Chronic Homelessness
- Improvements in Maintaining Housing Stability
- Improvements in Health Outcomes
- Decreases in publicly-funded institutions





- 2009 Seattle study found that moving chronic inebriates into permanent supportive housing resulted in an approximately 33 percent decline in alcohol use for clients
- Studies consistently find decreases in utilization of emergency rooms, state hospitals stays, jail costs, shelter costs, etc.
 - Buncombe: 31% decline in costs in one year
 - Guilford: 19% decline in costs in one year
 - Wake: 30% decline in costs after two years



Housing First

- An evidence-based practice that looks at housing as a tool, rather than a reward, for recovery.
- It is an approach to ending homelessness that centers on providing permanent housing first and then providing services as needed and requested.
- Pioneered by Dr. Sam Tsemberis from Pathways to Housing in New York City,
- Housing First believes that any person is ready for housing.



Housing First Principles

- Move people into housing directly from streets and shelters without preconditions of treatment acceptance or compliance;
- The provider is obligated to bring robust support services to the housing. These services are predicated on assertive engagement, not coercion;
- Continued tenancy is not dependent on participation in services;
- Units targeted to most disabled and vulnerable homeless members of the community;
- Embraces harm-reduction approach to addictions rather than mandating abstinence. At the same time, the provider must be prepared to support resident commitments to recovery;
- Residents must have leases and tenant protections under the law;
- Can be implemented as either a project-based or scattered site model.



DOJ Settlement

- 3000 Housing Slots of Community-Based Supportive Housing by July 1, 2010
- Access to transition and ongoing services
- In-reach activities in Adult Care Homes & State
 Psychiatric Hospitals
- Discharge/Transition
- Pre-admission Screening and Diversion
- Quality Assurance and Performance Improvement



DOJ Settlement Target Population

- Individuals with SMI who reside in ACHs determined by the State to be an IMD
- Individuals with SPMI who are residing in ACHs licensed for various populations
- Individuals with SPMI who are or will be discharged from a State Psychiatric Hospital and who are homeless or have unstable housing
- Individuals diverted from entry into ACHs pursuant to the pre-admission screening and diversion provisions established by the State.
