Buncombe County requests proposals for projects to help the community recover from and respond to COVID-19 and its negative economic impacts.

Buncombe County has been awarded \$50,733,290 in Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (Recovery Funding), as part of the American Rescue Plan Act. This infusion of federal resources is intended to help turn the tide on the pandemic, address its economic fallout, and lay the foundation for a strong and equitable recovery.

Buncombe County is committed to investing these funds in projects that:

- Align to county strategic plan and community priorities
- Support equitable outcomes for most impacted populations
- Leverage and align with other governmental funding sources
- Make best use of this one-time infusion of resources
- Have a lasting impact

Proposals shall be submitted in accordance with the terms and conditions of this RFP and any addenda issued hereto.

This initiative involves replacing swing gates with electronic gates at two parks.

Project Plan*

Once funds have been approved, an RFP will be issued to multiple vendors pursuant to Buncombe County policy. (Estimated cost is based on Garage Door Specialists.) Following vendor selection, units should be installed within two months.

Statement of Need*

Due to the layout of Buncombe County Sports Park and Charles D. Owen Park, Buncombe County staff has to travel back and forth to entrance/exit locations to let park visitors exit when the park closes. As neither park has any dedicated full- or part-time staff members, electronic gates would allow park workers to remain in the main area of the park at closing time to lock up buildings and make sure park visitors' vehicles exit without incidents. Gates open automatically to allow patrons to leave, but keep others from entering the park after closing hours. The electronic gates would also allow the park to open each day at a specified time.

Currently, various Buncombe County Recreation Services administrative staff members open and close these large regional parks each day. Automatic gates would allow staff to prioritize other projects and reduce greenhouse gas emissions currently associated with travel to these locations to merely unlock a gate. Electric gates can be operated via computer or cellular telephone.

As most options for families and community members shut down during COVID-19, public parks saw record-breaking visitation. As restaurants, amusement parks, and other entertainment options have reopened, attendance has not cooled. Our reality is that far more people are visiting public spaces than were originally envisioned – and that number will continue to grow as people retain the sense that outdoor gatherings and activities are safest.

Buncombe County Recreation Services is driven by the primary goal of providing equitable low- and no-cost opportunities for high-quality recreation and active living experiences. There are no exorbitant admission fees or exclusionary policies. Parks build a healthy, active community and aid in the prevention of chronic disease, provide therapeutic recreation services for those who are mentally or physically disabled, counter social isolation by connecting people with nature and each other, and also improve the mental and emotional health of all citizens.

Additionally, these three parks have been identified by Buncombe County emergency operations leaders as locations that can act as emergency shelter and healthcare locations during times of crisis such as the coronavirus pandemic. In fact, Buncombe County Sports Park was the site of a long-running drive thru vaccination clinic because of the sizable Latinx and Hispanic populations living within a small radius of the park.

The Department of Treasury has also clarified that American Rescue Plan funds can be used to address maintenance and upkeep issues because of the increased use parks saw during the pandemic and to improve spaces that have been disproportionately impacted.

Population Served*

These two parks are true regional hubs with visitors consisting of those who live nearby, other Buncombe County community members, others from within western North Carolina, and tourists. Both are located near neighborhoods (Enka-Candler and Swannanoa) that consist of aging apartment buildings, modest multi-family homes, mobile home parks, and new construction. As the overall rate of those covered by health insurance in Buncombe County is lower than the national average, the fitness courses, trails, playspaces, sports fields, and access to wellness-focused amenities are a particular draw for senior residents and families from low-income pocket neighborhoods near the park and help neighbors connect with one another to combat isolation. Buncombe County parks had over 2.5 million visits last year.

During the pandemic, local counties and municipalities realized having access to parks and open spaces are a necessity. The greatest impact on parks in the foreseeable future will be overcrowding. We must ensure that parks can accommodate a larger capacity of people and provide opportunities for spaces that can function for various activities in the sun and/or shade for both active and passive uses.

Many community members changed lifestyles to greater incorporate recreation and active living as daily staples within their lives as a result of COVID-19's effects. Now that the public has a renewed awareness of recreational opportunities, it is imperative that Buncombe County capitalize on this momentum to build and encourage healthy habits within those who live within the county boundaries. Buncombians are engaging in lifestyle changes that will ultimately save the County money in the coming decades and this is a chance to show leadership as a local government.

Equity Impact*

It is not enough to build a park and expect people to come. For-profit amusement and recreation entities such as Biltmore, Navitat, and local outdoor outfitters are focused on user experience, but those are not options for many residents from low-income households. Buncombe County's public parks (and safe connections to nearby low-income and majority minority neighbors via greenways, sidewalks, bike lanes, and natural trails) represent the promise of welcoming spaces and equal access for all. In many communities that have seen disinvestment, parks are ground zero for civic commitments to be made or broken. We demonstrate care through asking residents and delivering on those commitments.

What does this look like in a post-pandemic world? We cannot solve our problems with the same thinking we used when we created them. It is well documented that years of neglect and disinvestment have saddled our lowest income neighborhoods more exposed to pollution, natural disasters such as flooding, and health disparities. By reducing litter and greenhouse gas emissions at these large regional parks, we seek to deliver the proven environmental, health, economic, and social impacts of greener parks and open spaces for low-income households and BIPOC park users.

A 2018 Penn State study examining the impact of the Great Recession found that local park and recreation agency funding plunged 21% between 2009 and 2013. No local government service — public safety, education, or transportation — suffered as much. Equitable and accessible parks, recreation, and active living spaces are essential to addressing the Buncombe 2025 focus areas of an educated and capable community, environmental and energy stewardship, resident well-being, and a vibrant economy:

- Promote community resiliency and wellness by providing better mental health, improved physical health, and increased physical activity by providing safe multigenerational spaces for popular sports, adaptive and inclusive play, greenways and hiking trails, swimming pools, and many other activities designed to promote active lifestyles.
- Critical to childhood development and foster mountain spirit, imagination and creativity, healthy habits, teamwork, social equity, emotional stability, mutual trust, and environmental responsibility.
- Drive economic opportunity by expanding the local tax base through support of the outdoor recreation economy, increased tourism, and attraction and retention of businesses.
- Build healthy, active communities that aid in the prevention of chronic disease, provide therapeutic recreation services for those who are mentally or physically disabled, counter social isolation by connecting people with nature and each other, and also improve the mental and emotional health of all citizens.
- Provide cost-effective and sustainable environmental solutions while preserving the culture, beauty, and well-being of our region.
