<b>Quarter 1</b>	We continue to be challenged to successfully recruit a candidate for the position associated with this project.
<b>Quarter 2</b>	Through the second quarter we continued to work with our Human Resources department to fill the position associated with this grant. A candidate has been interviewed and offered the position and may start as early as 1/23/23.
<b>Quarter 3</b>	The candidate, Dr. Tom Heffner, began his position on 2/1/23. Due to the timing of his hire, he could not teach courses for Spring semester 2023. However, he is available to meet with struggling students, and faculty have referred multiple students to him. Much of his focus has been on increasing the number of enrolled students. In the two months Dr. Heffner has been in this position he has given ten (10) face-to-face presentations, conducted six (6) Zoom Meetings and six (6) phone calls. He has reached over 240 potential new students. This includes 149 high school students, forty-one childcare providers, teachers, and staff as well as forty-two other community organizations. Dr. Heffner developed a QR Code flyer and other online materials with an embedded electronic interest form. This interest form is for the potential students to share contact information, prior to becoming an A-B Tech student, so the College can share information with them about upcoming events, scholarships, grants, and other information. This interest form generated the names of twenty students who wish to begin the Early Childhood Certificate in the fall semester. Dr. Heffner has plans to offer Zoom meeting updates in May and Come to Campus events in mid-June.

<b>Quarter 4</b>	<p>In the fourth quarter, the Education Department continued our community outreach and recruitment efforts. We are thrilled to announce that we have 24 students participating in our new cohort program for the Early Childhood Certificate beginning in August! We currently have a waiting list for that program and hope to start a second cohort once our new faculty member for the 2023-24 grant cycle is hired. We also recruited a number of new students who will be enrolled in non-cohort classes.</p> <p>As part of our community outreach and recruitment efforts, faculty met with the YWCA, Community Action Opportunities, Transformation Village, Children First/Communities in Schools, Buncombe Partnership for Children, and Mars Hill University. We also finalized a new Memorandum of Understanding with Asheville City Schools that will allow our students to complete their observations, assignments, and practicum experiences in Asheville City Preschool.</p> <p>Faculty began several new projects this quarter using grant funding! First, Dr. Adam Holland and Catasha Williams from the Frank Porter Graham Child Development Institute at UNC-Chapel Hill traveled to Asheville and presented three trainings on challenging behaviors in the classroom. We had almost 40 local child care directors, teachers, technical assistance providers, and coaches attend these sessions! We know that challenging behaviors in classrooms have a direct impact on the recruitment and retention of early childhood teachers. We also know there are racial equity issues surrounding challenging behaviors and discipline in early childhood classrooms. We hope to bring Adam and Catasha back for future sessions.</p> <p>Second, Tamara Reynolds and Jodi York attended the International Inclusion Institute at UNC-Chapel Hill where there was a special track for community college early childhood faculty. Tamara and Jodi worked with SCRIPT NC to begin revising the Early Childhood Certificate Courses to ensure that course content is accessible for students. SCRIPT NC partners with select North Carolina community colleges to enhance coursework and practica experiences in early childhood programs by incorporating evidence-based and competency-based practices. EDU 119, EDU 145, and EDU 146 were assessed using SCRIPT-NC Assignment Alignment Tool, and those courses will be updated for the 2023-2024 school year.</p> <p>Finally, faculty began working with A-B Tech's Continuing Education Department to develop a 6-week Orientation Course that will be piloted as part of the new cohort. Using grant funds, we were able to purchase a new mobile laptop lab that will be used during that course. The course will cover learning strategies for academic success, college and community resources, and necessary computer skills for writing assignments and navigating Moodle. All cohort students will complete the Orientation Course prior to taking EDU 119 and other curriculum courses in the Early Childhood Certificate.</p>

**Comments:**

Q3: These data are available by semester for us and there is a lag on reporting. For Q3, we have attached results for Fall 2022 (Q2) for EDU 119 which show significant academic improvement. EDU 144 & 145 data are not available due to enrollment <20.

Q4: Due to personnel turnover, we have struggled to replicate our baseline data to make an apples-to-apples comparison of our impact measures.

The “graded enrollment count” is not necessarily an accurate measure of program success as this is a duplicated count (# of students enrolled x the number of courses taken). Enrolling more students is a valid success metric. Enrolling more students in more courses may not be if this results in lower course success rates. The number reported is a deduplicated headcount of enrolled ECE students which is a much more accurate measure of program growth. This number has remained relatively flat for 2020 (167), 2021 (151), and 2022 (152). Little progress was made in the SY22 numbers due to the late hiring of project personnel; however, impact will be shown in SY23 with a significant increase in enrollment due to outreach efforts conducted during this program period.

Detailed program and success data are attached which follow replicable methodologies.
