Contract Synopsis: Jail diversion serves individuals who are in custody within the Buncombe County Detention Facility with serious and persistent mental health disorders (SPMI) and/or substance use disorder with the goal to connect justice involved individuals to appropriate behavioral health resources, reduce the jail population, and reduce recidivism.

Prison re-entry serves and supports individuals that were formerly incarcerated in NC Department of Public Safety prison facilities at high risk for recidivism with the goal of providing comprehensive supports to those transitioning from prison to community to reduce recidivism.

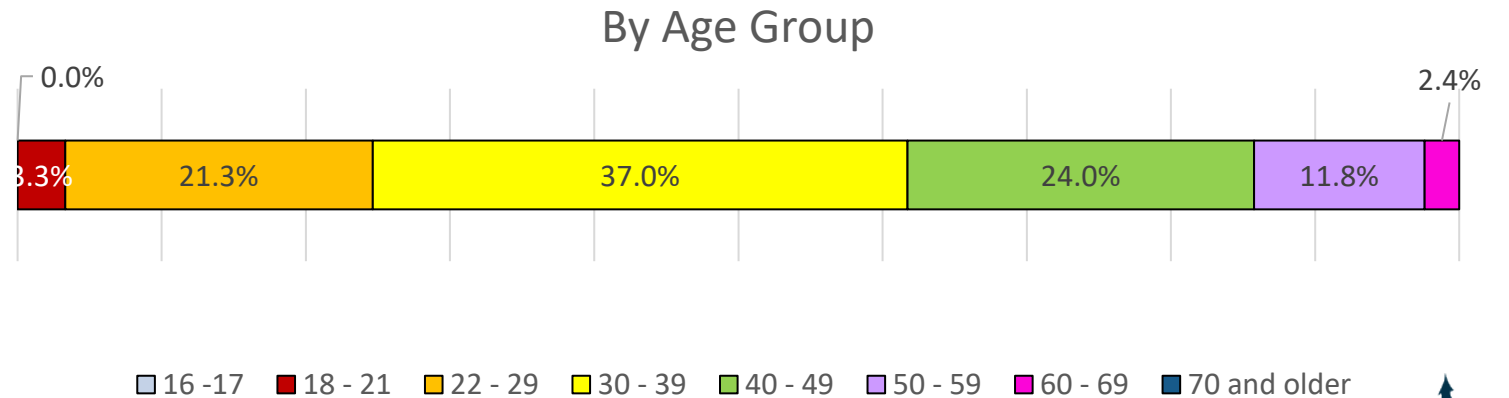
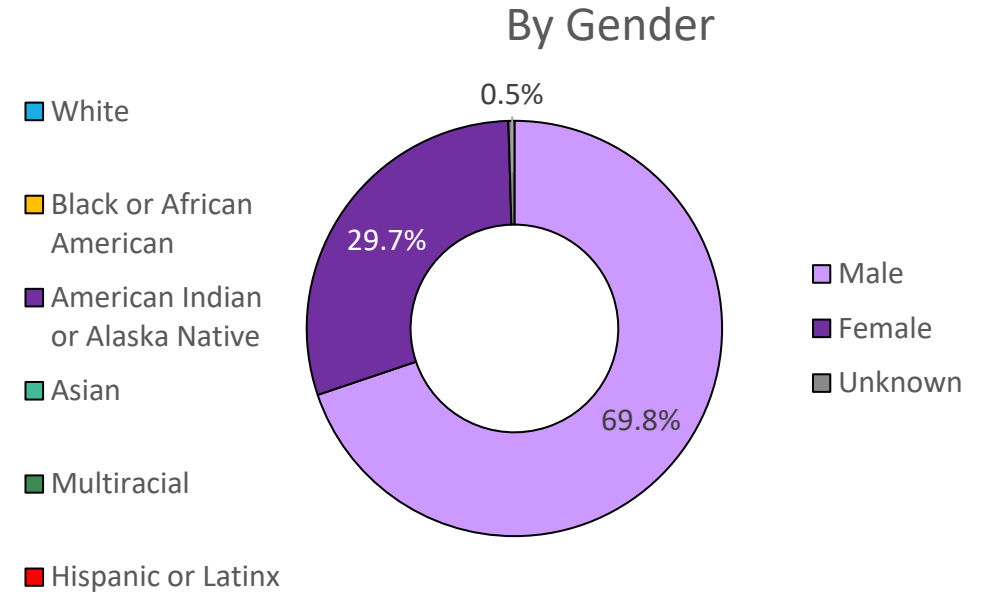
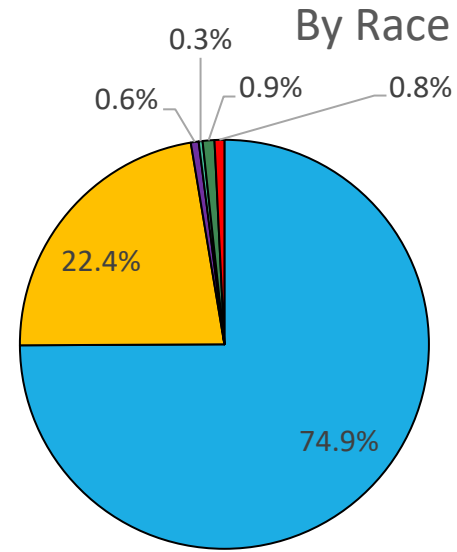
Reporting Highlights:

- *146 total clients released to treatment (inpatient, detox, residential and/or outpatient)*



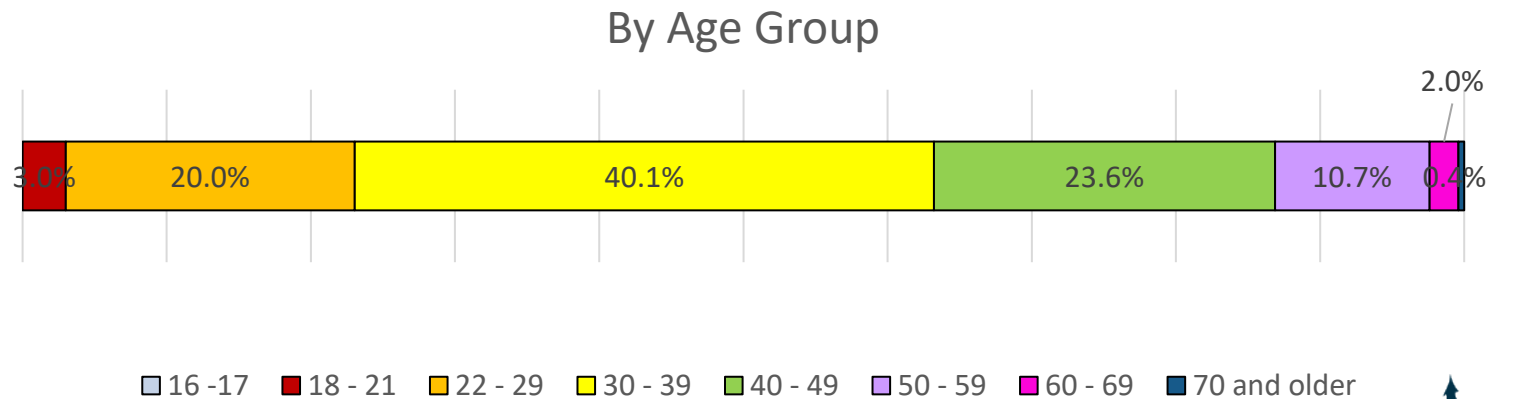
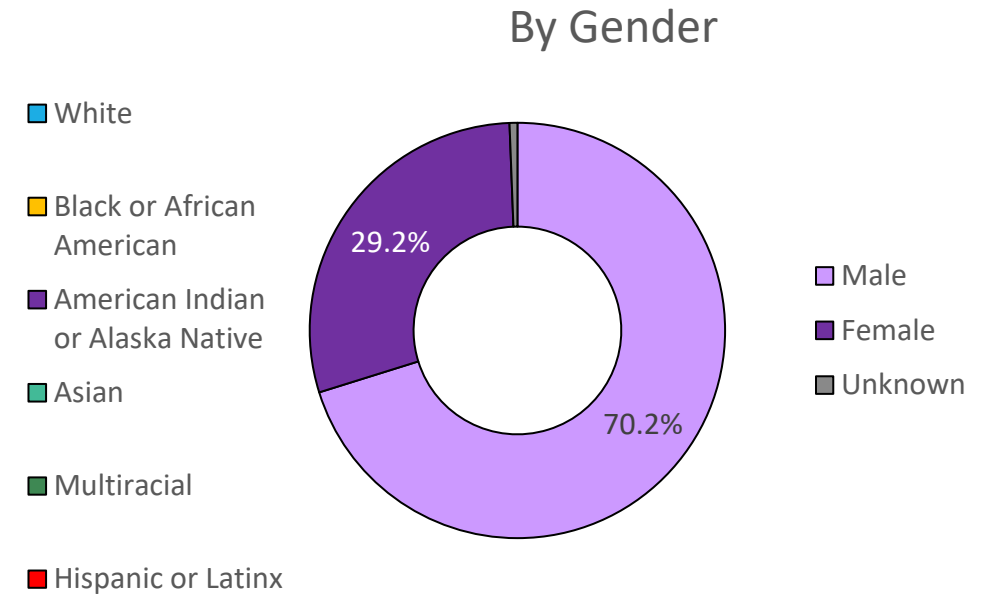
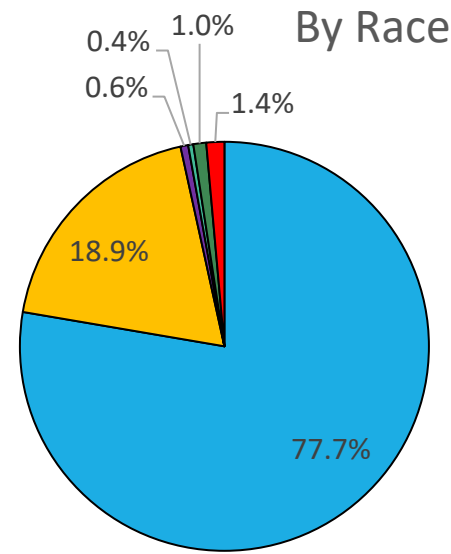
How much did we do?

- Total number of GAINS: 646
- Total number of unduplicated GAINS: 634
- 74.9% identified as White and 22.4% identified as Black or African Americans
- 69.8% identified as males and 29.7% identified as female
- Those aged 30 to 39 made up 37.0% of GAINS and those aged 40 to 49 years made up 24.0%



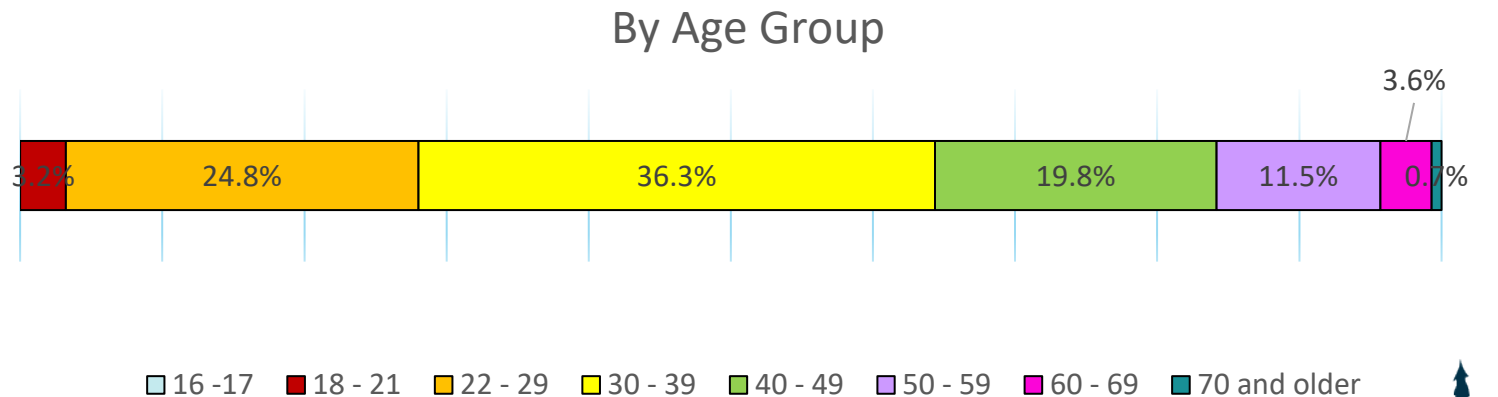
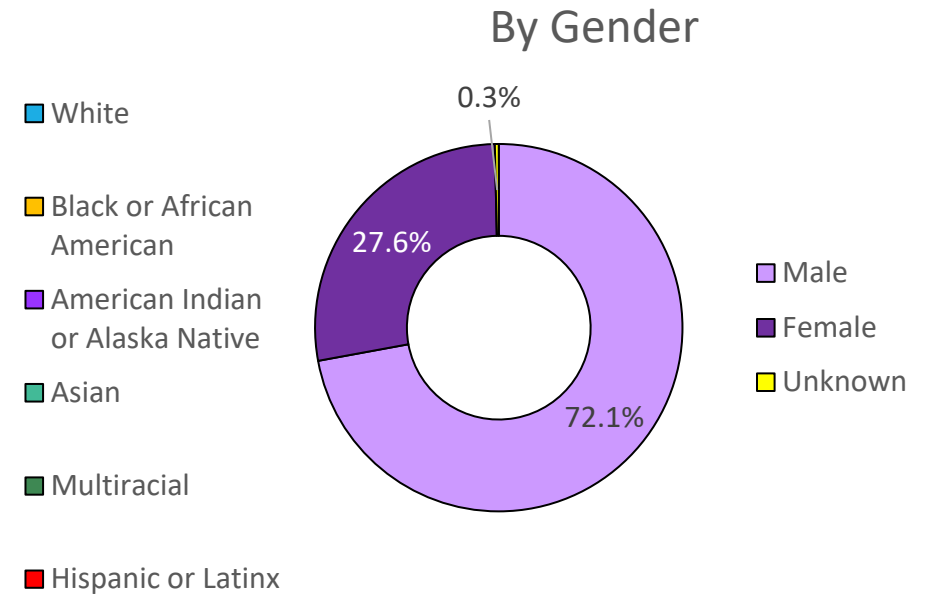
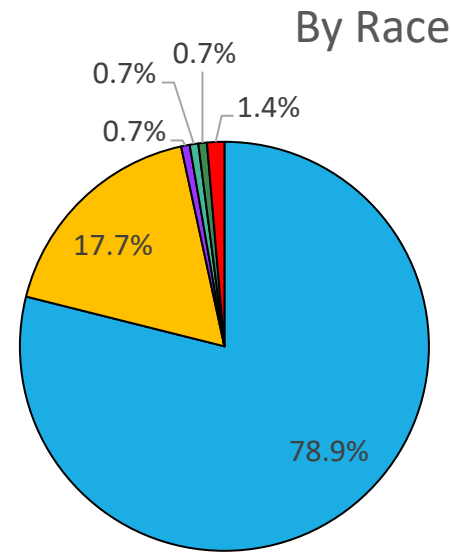
How much did we do?

- 493 diversion plans presented to service providers
- 77.7% identified as White and 18.9% identified as Black or African Americans
- 70.2% identified as males and 29.2% identified as female
- Those aged 30 to 39 made up 40.1% of all plans presented and those aged 40 to 49 years made up 23.6%



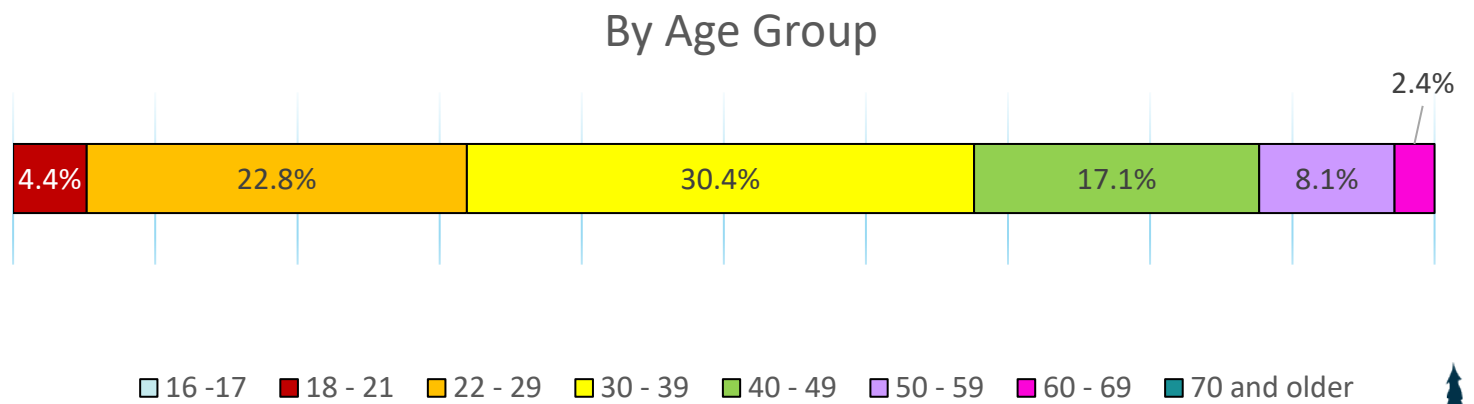
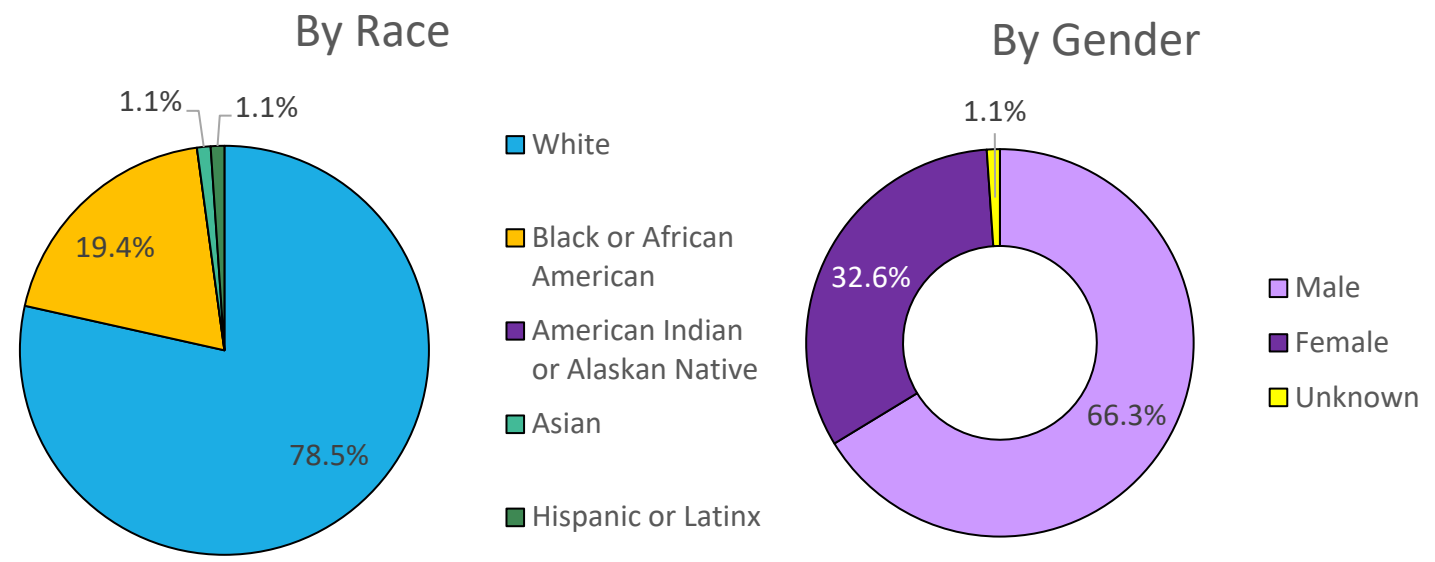
How much did we do?

- 294 diversion plans presented to Courts
- 78.9% identified as White and 17.7% identified as Black or African Americans
- 72.1% identified as males and 27.6% identified as female
- Those aged 30 to 39 made up 36.3% of all plans presented and those aged 22 to 29 years made up 24.8%

- 123 diversion plans accepted by the Courts
- 78.5% identified as White and 19.4% identified as Black or African Americans
- 66.3% identified as males and 32.6% identified as female
- Those aged 30 to 39 made up 30.4% of all plans and those aged 40 to 49 years made up 28.3%

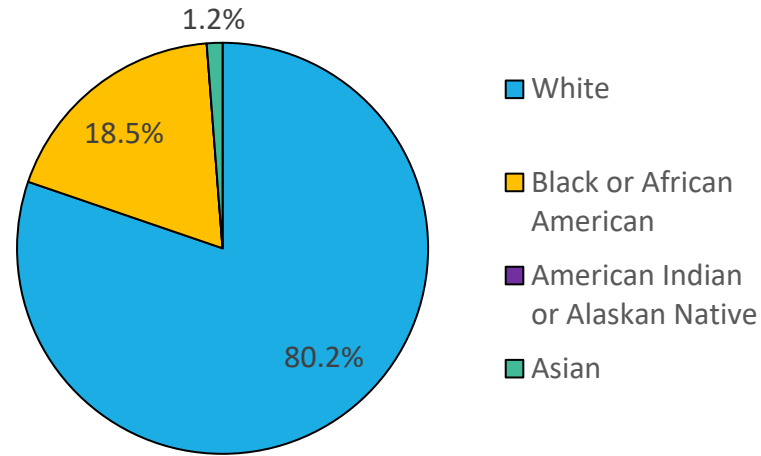


Is anyone better off?

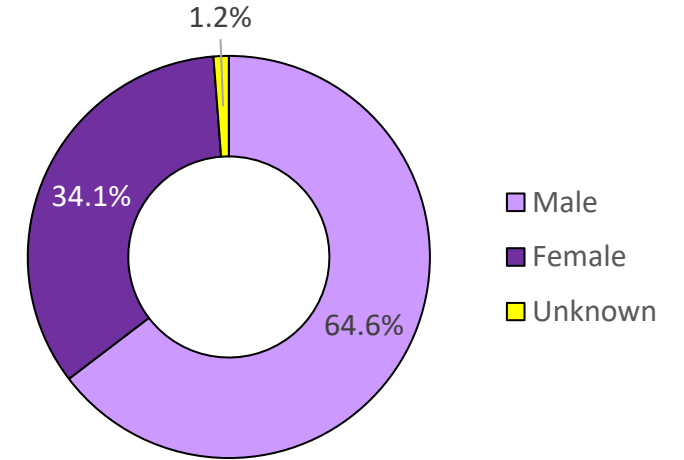
- 81 clients released to treatment (inpatient, detox, residential and/or outpatient)*

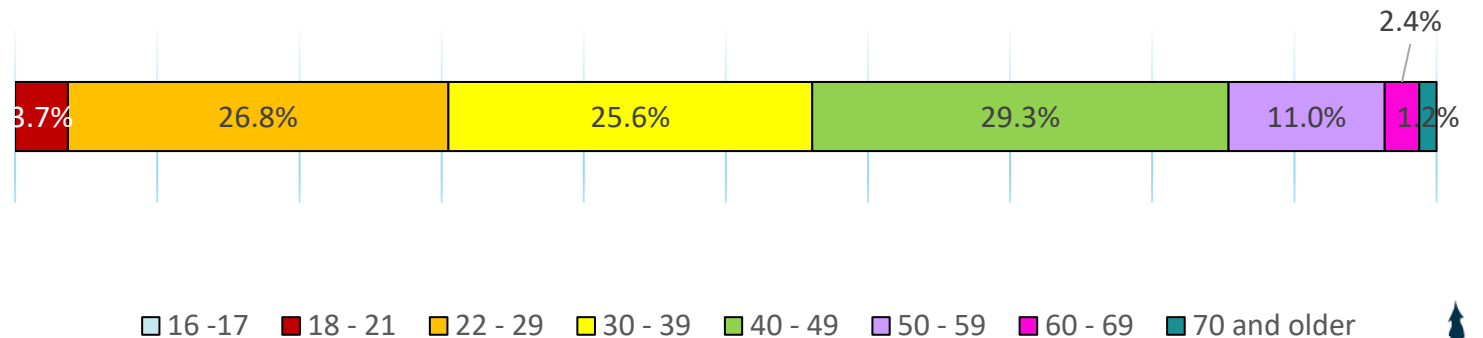
By Race



By Gender



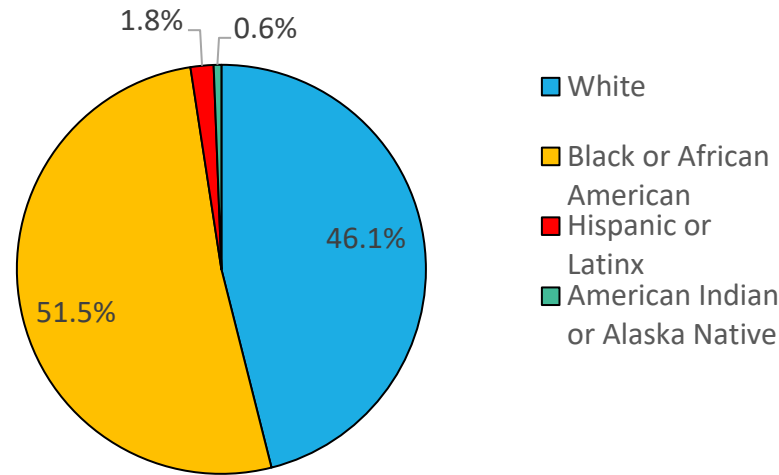
By Age Group



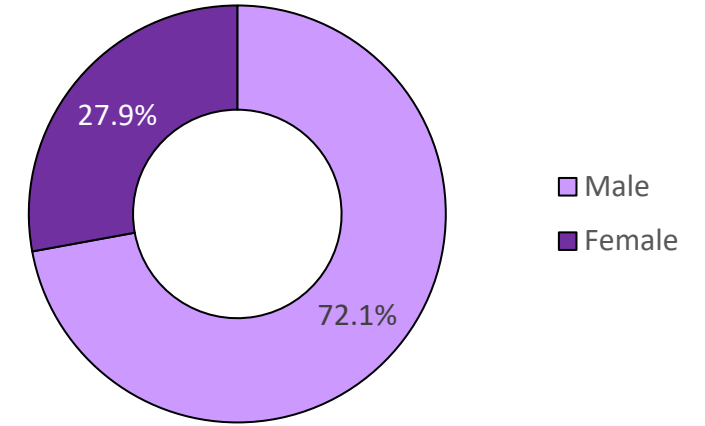
How much did we do?

- 165 unduplicated group participants

- Those aged 30 to 39 made up 38.2% of all unduplicated group participants and those aged 22 to 29 years made up 30.3%

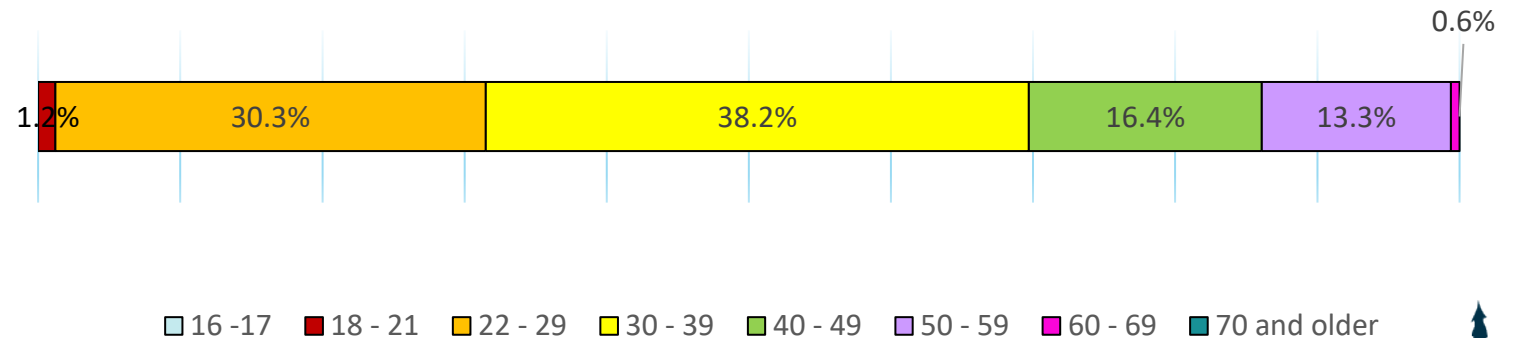
By Race



By Gender

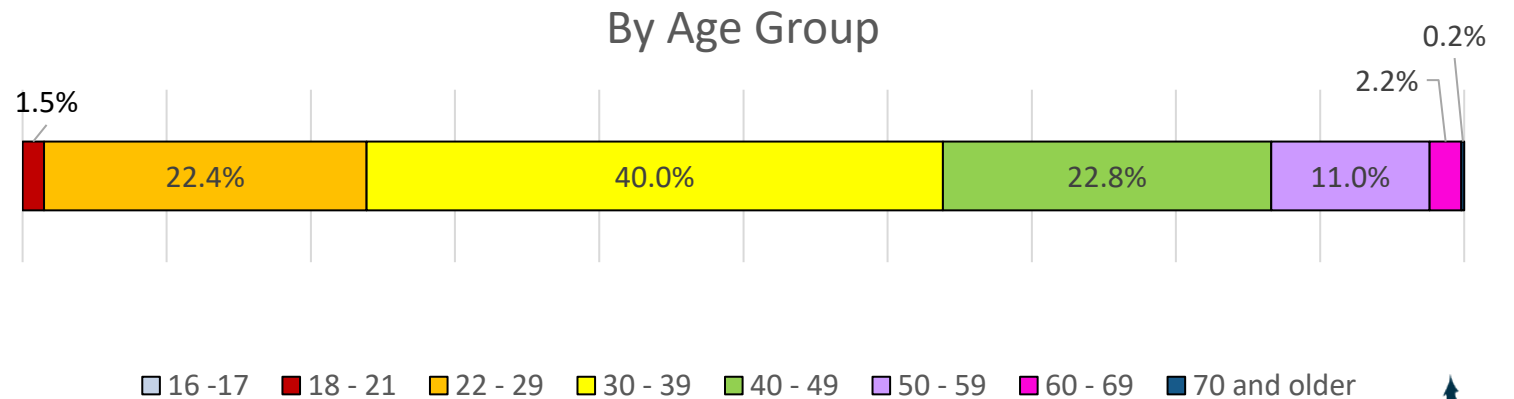
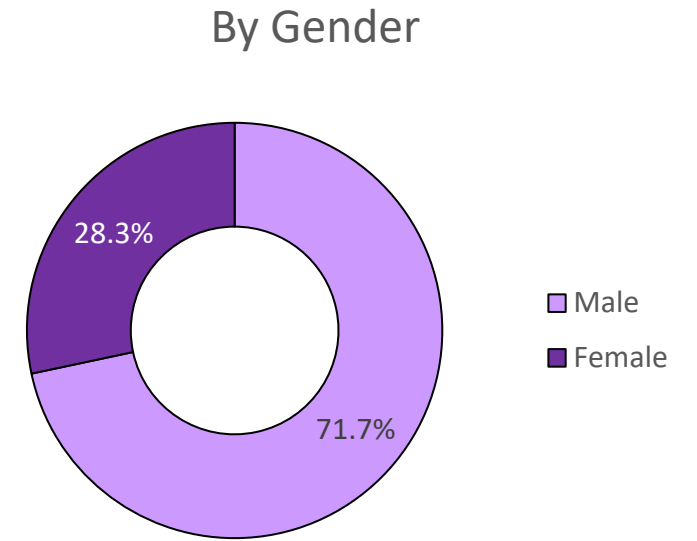
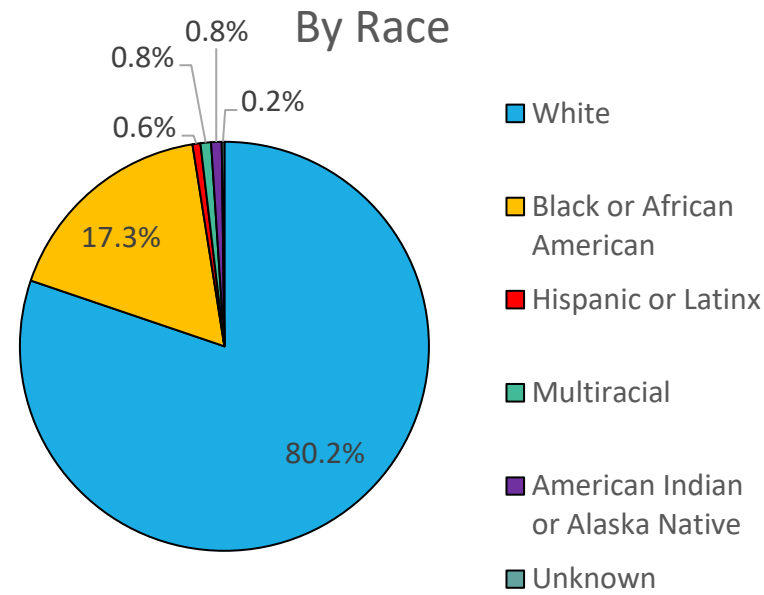


By Age Group



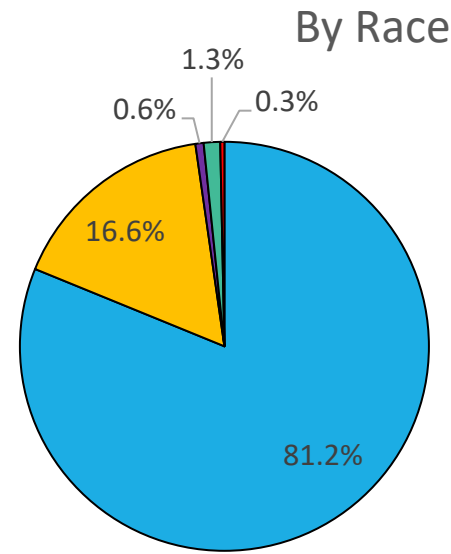
Substance Use Disorder Clients: How much did we do?

- Total number of GAINS: 480
- Total number of unduplicated GAINS: 479
- 80.2% identified as White and 17.3% identified as Black or African Americans
- 71.7% identified as males and 28.3% identified as female
- Those aged 30 to 39 made up 40.0% of GAINS and those aged 40 to 49 years made up 22.8%

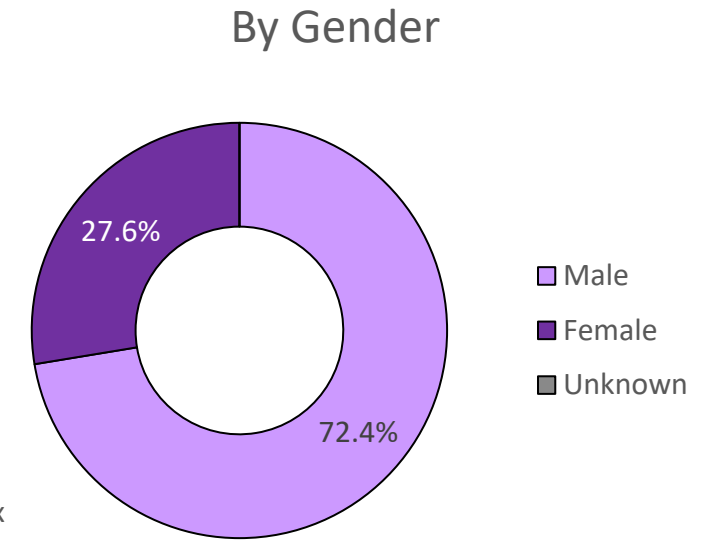


Substance Use Disorder Clients: How much did we do?

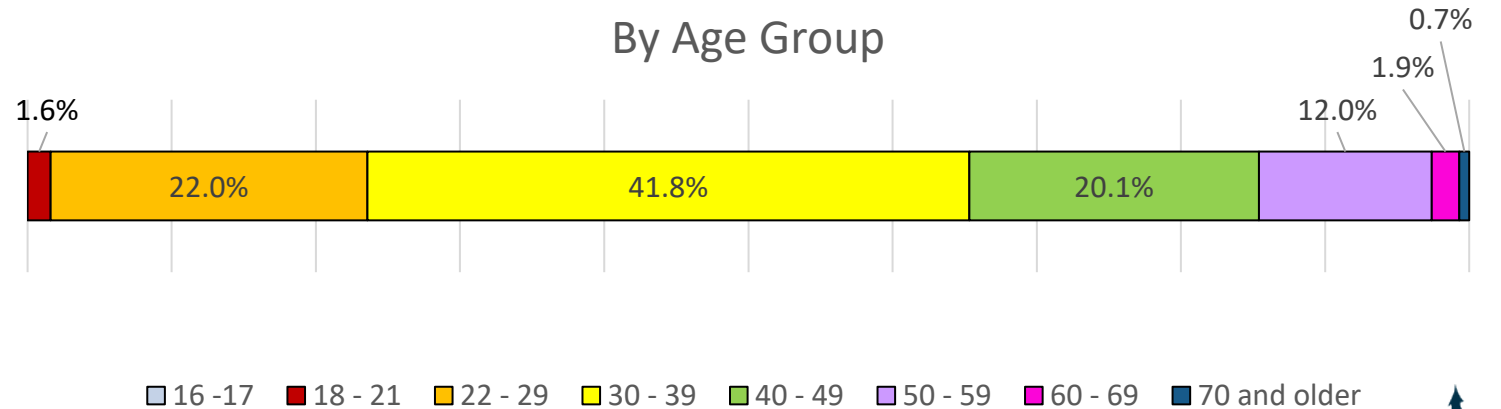
- 309 diversion plans presented to service providers

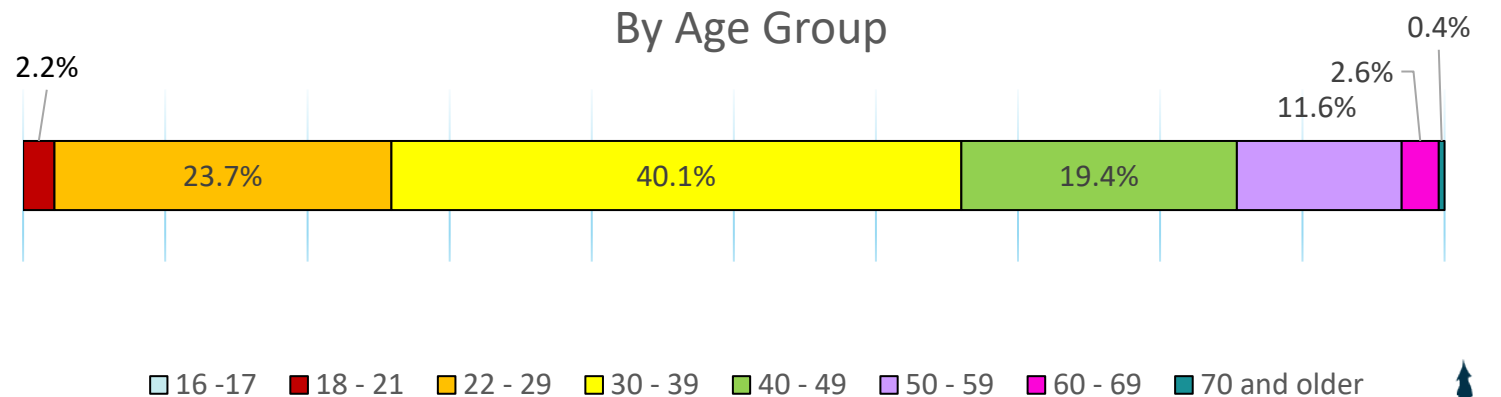
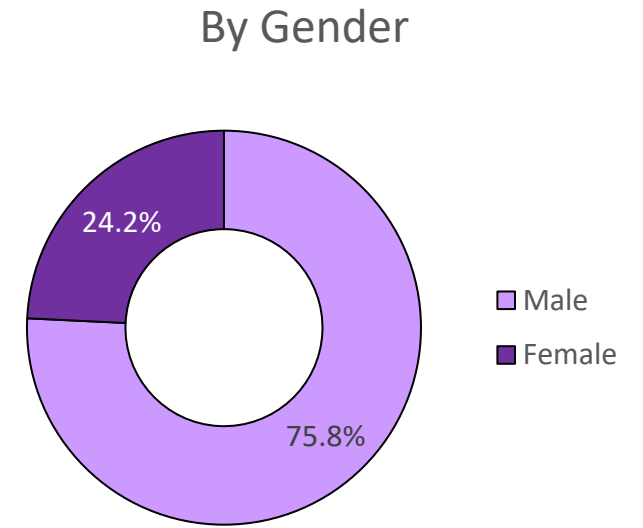
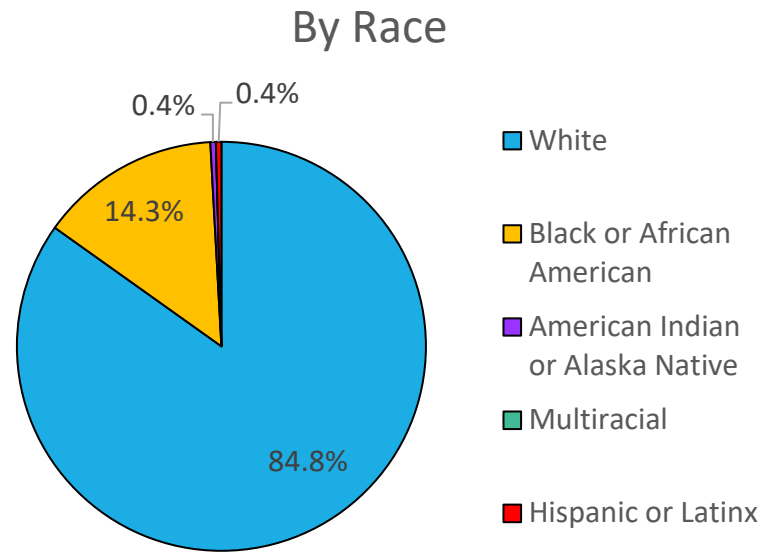

Substance Use Disorder Clients: How much did we do?

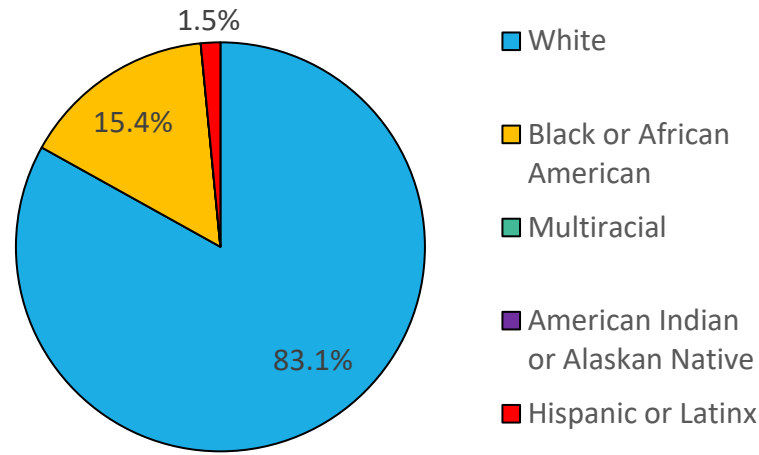
- 231 diversion plans presented to Courts
- 84.8% identified as White and 14.3% identified as Black or African Americans
- 75.8% identified as males and 24.2% identified as female
- Those aged 30 to 39 made up 40.1% of all plans presented and those aged 22 to 29 years made up 23.7%



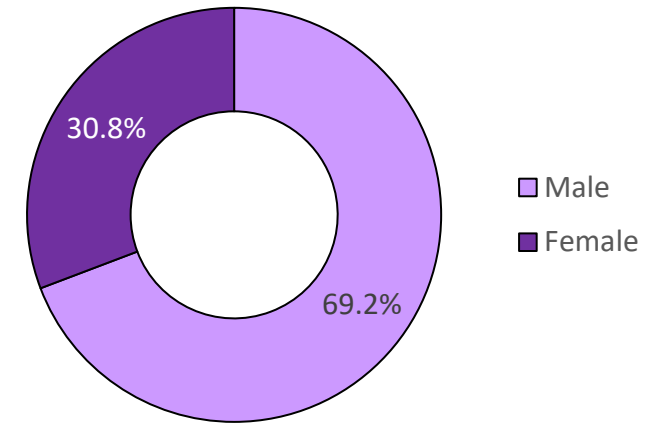
Substance Use Disorder Clients: Is anyone better off?

- Those aged 30 to 39 made up 35.4% of all plans presented and those aged 40 to 49 years made up 26.2%

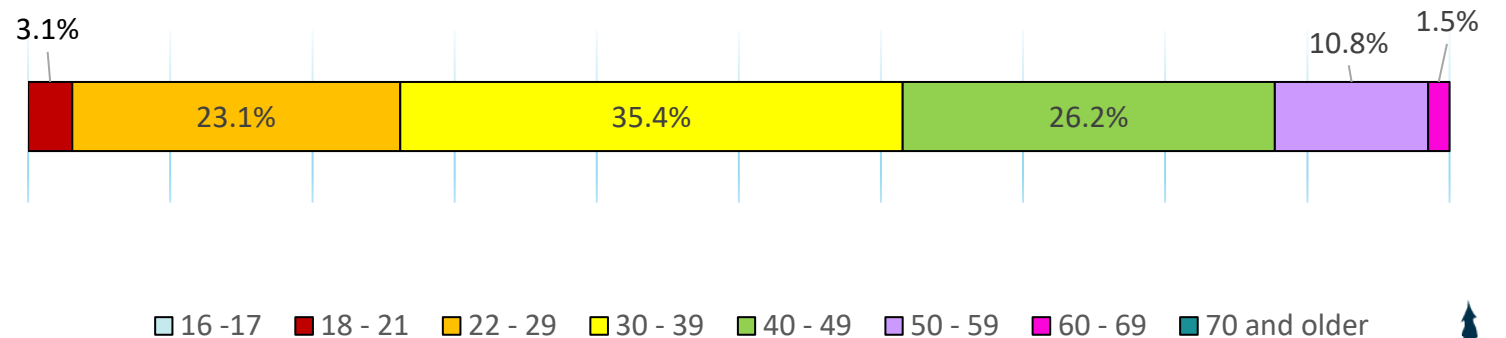
By Race

By Age Group

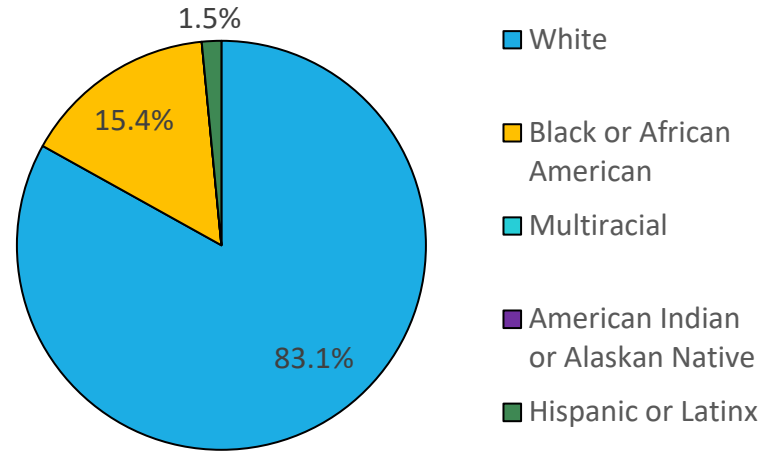

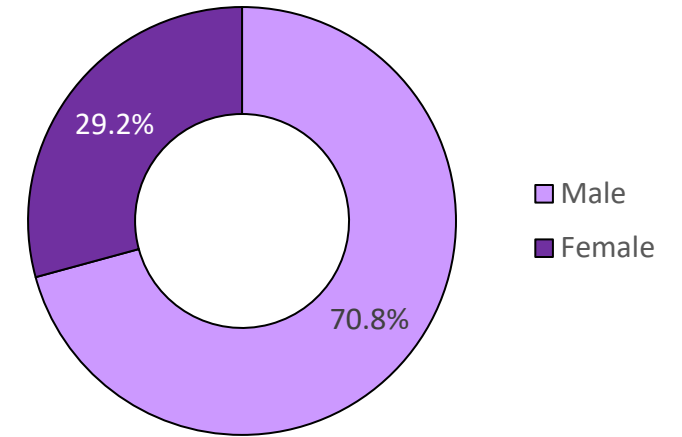
- 65 clients released to treatment (inpatient, detox, residential and/or outpatient)*
